


# THE CONTEXT



### Sicily (2018):

- the highest unemployment rate in Italy (21.5%)
- 22.5% of families live below relative poverty line
- 19.2% of economy is black and illegal

#### Messina (250,000 inhabitants):

- per-capita income in the city centre is 4 times higher than in northern outskirts and 6 times higher than in southern outskirts.
- more than 2.000 families dwell in slums built in the aftermath of 1908 earthquake










#### THE FOUNDATION

- The Foundation was created in 2010 to promote social justice and sustainable economic and human development by designing, experimenting and promoting new socio-economic policies
- Given the irreducible complexity and multidimensionality of poverty and inequality of the local context, the policies to tackle such issues must necessarily be complex and must involve structural actions
- It was promoted by a group of **highly diversified social economy organizations** which needed a coordinating entity
- The Foundation works creating **fruitful interconnections** among the welfare, cultural, production, research and technology systems and today **leads a wide social economy cluster** made of foundations, social enterprises, associations, etc.
- The **transformative capacity** of the Foundation in its community and beyond is deeply linked with the ability to **embrace** at the same time all the SDGs, as interconnected and interdependent




#### individual and community social support services

# THE APPROACH



Individual, isolated & marginalized in the local context


Full integration in a network/system inspired by the social economy principles



Personalized social support programmes for over 700 people.

### Some examples:

- 60 internees of the local Judicial Psychiatric Hospital were brought out and reintegrated into society. Today they live free and, by enhancing their skills and abilities, they have gradually conquered the main citizenship rights (home, work, social life, knowledge);
- 200 families (about 600 people, including many children) have left the slums of Messina and regained their right to housing, often becoming direct owners of a proper house.









Supported and/or financed the start-up and/or consolidation phase of **about 120 companies** and micro-enterprises, corresponding to **over 400 job places** created and/or consolidated, out of which almost **100 are for highly disadvantaged people**, in the following sectors:

- the renewable energy sector
- the technological innovation sector
- the design and fashion sector
- the food and beverage sector











**Urban regeneration and requalification** of common goods, aimed at enhancing the social capabilities of the territories: it coordinated and financed the renovation and refunctionalization of 6 highly valuable environmental and architectural/monumental areas, that were abandoned or had been confiscated from the Mafia.

















**Technology transfer programmes** aimed at supporting sustainable human development and tackling inequalities.

About ten prototypes have been created, tested or are in the testing phase, all supporting the green transition and the fight against inequalities and poverty.









**Cultural productions and internationalization processes**, attracting external creative talents and developing local ones.
